MUNICIPALITIES INSTRUCTED TO DEAL HARSHLY WITH ILLEGAL CONNECTION OF WATER SUPPLY

ith an estimate population of 6 146 972 across five (5) district municipalities, the Limpopo provincial government has held their Water and Sanitation Summit at Warmbaths Forever Resort in Bela Bela District Municipality.

The summit comes after all 5 District Municipalities and water sectors has held their own summit to find solutions. The provincial summit is set to discuss shortage of water in the province. When he addressed more than 500 delegates, Premier Stanley Chupu Mathabatha said the summit was a follow up Water Summit that was held in Tzaneen back in 2015.

"This summit stands to address the provision of bulk infrastructure and water resourcing planning, issue of water reticulation, water to support economic development, treatment works and rural sanitation operations and maintenance"

The summit aims to address bulk infrastructure operation and maintenance plan with practical and implemental plan with targets and times frames which will be easy to monitor and evaluate based on targets and timeframes.

The summit is held when the province is currently recovering from drought session which have severely impacted negatively on the 2015 Tzaneen resolutions.

"This shortage of water supply has impacted negatively on the implementation of our Limpopo Development Plan (LDP) targets, bold plans we have enumerated in the LDP are depended on the availability of reliable and sufficient water supply"

The Premier has called on municipalities to deal harshly with illegal conduct of residents who are connecting water supply to the main water pipelines which results in huge water lose. He has called on to the communities to guard against the fraudulent use of the infrastructure.

It has been established that most municipalities are being billed for consumption that has never been used by communities due to leakage and theft.

"I am happy that national representatives are here to listen to our views because I want to tell you that the current licencing system is outdated, water usage has significally changed over time, We are currently talking Musina Makhado Special Economic Zone (SEZ) which is expected to revitalize industrial up and down stream and will change the consumption and use of water in the province"

Currently Limpopo has received 1 159 water use licence application and total of 1 067 have been finalised with 92 applications in progress to be finalised.

Giving an update on the implementation of the 2015 Water and Sanitation Resolutions, Deputy Director General for Planning in the Office of the Premier Ms Magwaza took audience through resolutions and admitted that the province has not made progress in all resolutions, and that drought played a major role in implementing all taken resolution in a summit held in Tzaneen.

Amongst those that were implemented, is the bulk infrastructure and a master plan which was developed to address the infrastructure in the province.

In 2015 Limpopo sanitation was at 43% which was way below that of the 71% provision by national average for households. A draft plan has been developed and will be consulted with relevant stakeholders before the end of the 2018/2019 financial year.

To address maintenance and operations, 10% of the operational budget has been set aside which will focus on hot spots were communities take to the streets to demonstrate their dissatisfaction with inadequate supply of water in their areas.

To engage and review the presented Master Plan, delegates were taken to commissions which dealt with the following issues;

- Provision of bulk infrastructure and Water Resource Planning
- Water to support Economic development
- Waste water treatment works and rural sanitation
- · Operation and maintenance

Commissions will report back to the summit by end of the summit and resolutions taken will form part of those taken in 2015 to improve maintenance and bulk infrastructure with the aim of improving water

Senior traditional leader, Thovhele Vho-Mmbangiseni Manenzhe has urged other traditional leaders to work closely with government to develop their communities. Manenzhe was speaking shortly after the Musina Municipality Council meeting which was held at his area of jurisdiction, Ha-Manenzhe. Manenzhe is one of the senior traditional leaders who has been allocated a seat at the Council of Musina Municipality.

Manenzhe said he was impressed by the fact that the municipality has state of the art facilities in Musina town, but they decided to hold their important meeting in a deep rural village to interact with ordinary citizens.

He continued: "It is important to work with our political leaders to bring services to our people. The municipality is the catalyst for service delivery and we as traditional leaders, only provide land. If there is no cooperation between the municipality and traditional leaders, ordinary people suffer most because they will not receive the much needed services. Indeed, we are very

impressed about this important

We will definitely work hard with the municipality to make sure that we develop our communities as efficient as possible. I also make a call to all stakeholders and community members to put their differences aside and hold hands with the municipality for community development."

Musina Mayor, Cllr Mihloti Muhlope said the visit continues to pave a way to create a platform to engage citizens on issues related to service delivery. "I'm happy because traditional leaders are taking our visits very seriously. Traditional leaders are one of our main stakeholders because a huge land in our municipality belongs to them.

It is important to take them on board so that we can have a common understanding on community development initiatives. The fact that we have allocated them seats in our council is a clear indication that we are ready to work with them." Muhlope said the Council meetings will rotate to all senior traditional leaders who seat in the Council of Musina Municipality.

oung people should stand up and create their own jobs instead of waiting for the government to give them golden opportunities. This is the positive message from Mpho MichelPhupheli (29) of Musina, whose entrepreneurship spirit is lifting up young people's desires of becoming their own bosses. The young man, who established Walaza De Mkupe Projects three years ago, deals with scrap metals which he later sells to licenced dealers around the country.

Phupheli's hard work, perseverance and zeal to succeed has caught the attention of Musina Mayor, Cllr Mihloti Muhlope who paid him a visit in his workshop last week.

The young entrepreneur said he wants to correct people's perceptions that the scrap metal business is designated to a certain group of people. "When we grew up, we used to see a large group of the white population in this kind of business. Now that South Africa is a free country

and we have equal rights, I want to prove that everyone can succeed in every business venture that we choose. The most important thing is to work hard, set your targets and have achievable goals."

Phupheli, who works with his younger brother Visect who is full time employee of the company says he employs four to five people per month on temporary basis depending on the load of the job. "These people can put some bread on the table because of this business and I'm happy that I'm contributing to their families' livelihood. I plan to employ more than twenty people on full time basis in the next five years."

He pleaded to the Mayor to provide his business with land because he is presently renting someone's yard.

Mayor Mihloti Muhlope said she is pleased that Phupheli is making a difference in the local community. "We will send a team to assess how best we can assist this young man to grow his business.

He is a true example that anything is possible in our democratic country. I hope other young people will learn from him that South Africa is full with opportunities and young people should grasp them with both hands. Indeed, we are very proud of this young man."

LIMPOPO CONVENED PROVINCIAL MEMBERS ASSEMBLY

impopo Provincial Office of SALGA convened a two-day Provincial Members Assembly at the 2Ten Hotel in Sibasa in Thulamela Local Municipality. The Assembly was held in a historic year that marks 100 years since the birth of struggle icons, Nelson Mandela and Albertina Sisuliu who dedicated their lives in the struggle for freedom and contributed immensely to the birth of a new South Africa, as we have come to know it since 1994.

In terms of the SALGA constitution, Limpopo as a provincial member shall, at least once a year, hold a meeting of members to be known and described in the notice calling such meeting as the Provincial Members Assembly. The Provincial Members Assembly considered the adoption of SALGA's programme of action, business plan and the budget as approved by the Provincial Executive Committee; reflected on reports from provincial working groups and oversight bodies; and dealt with issues emanating from the provisions of SALGA Constitution applicable to provincial members, among other issues.

The Assembly brought together Executive Mayors/Mayors, Speakers, Chief Whips, Municipal Managers and Chief Financial Officers under one roof to explore new and innovative ways to empower, resource, and capacitate municipalities to live up to the ideals of good governance, financial sustainability and universal access to good quality services. It also, amongst others, addressed issues around effective performance solutions; support programmes to vulnerable groups; impact of Aids and TB on local government; municipal demarcation and effect on governance and financial sustainability; councillor support and welfare; key infrastructure challenges in rural municipalities and solutions; and roads classification and socioeconomic development.

Presentations were received from the Director of Manto Management Consulting, Mr Gary Moonsammy about developing effective performance solutions and IEC's Provincial Electoral Officer, Ms Nkaro Mateta on Preparation towards 2019 National and Provincial Elections. There was also a panel discussion on "making municipalities viable for investment" with panellists ranging from Limpopo Department of Cooperative Governmence, Human Settlement and Traditional Affairs (CoGHSTA), Limpopo Department of Economic Development, Environment and Tourism (LEDET), Road Agency Limpopo (RAL) to Unemployment Insurance Fund (UIF).

The Provincial Executive Committee of SALGA in Limpopo used the opportunity to announce newly elected members of the NEC and PEC. This was done in accordance to Clause 13.5 of the SALGA Constitution, as amended, which stipulates that "any vacancy, which occurs in the office of any of the office bearers and/or additional members between National/Provincial Conferences, shall be filled by the National/Provincial Executive Committee" (the insertion of Provincial is to give effect to clause 21.5.3 which states that the provisions of 13.5 shall apply mutatis mutandis to Provincial Executive Committees). The NEC or PEC therefore has the constitutional prerogative to fill the vacancy and could do so by either appointing from within the current membership of the NEC/PEC or may consider any other councillor which may not necessarily be a member of the NEC/PEC. Should the NEC or PEC appoint a member from the current NEC/PEC, cognisance must also be taken that a need will still arise to fill the vacancy that would be created by such appointment.

In a media statement, the organisation welcomed changes effected to the Provincial Executive Committee (PEC). SALGA ,articularly thanked Cllr Thembi Nkadimeng and Cllr Keamotseng Ramaila for all their work done during their tenure as Provincial Chairperson and 1st Deputy Provincial Chairperson respectively. "We wish them well in their new responsibilities as Deputy President and National Executive Committee (NEC) Member of SALGA as appointed by NEC and PEC respectively", read the statement.

SALGA welcomed the appointment of Vhembe Executive Mayor, Cllr Florence Radzilani as the new Provincial Chairperson and Ba-Phalaborwa Mayor Cllr Pule Shai as 1st Deputy Chairperson of SALGA in Limpopo.

Cllr Florence Radzilani made her vision for the organisation, members and communities very clear:

"I thank the previous chairperson who is now the SALGA deputy president, for laying the foundation on which we could all move forward with high speed in matters of service delivery and in enhancing the representative role of SALGA," concluded Cllr Florence Radzilani.

<u>Municipalities should remain our strategic engines of development</u>

Limpopo Premier, Chupu Mathabatha started by expressing his appreciations and that of the Limpopo government for the generous invitation to participate in the SALGA Provincial Members Assembly. Before he went further, he should took the opportunity to congratulate newly elected National Deputy President of SALGA Cllr Thembi Nkadimeng.

"We are convinced that representing us at that level will accrue some benefits for us in the Province. We wish you all of the best in your new responsibilities," said Premier Mathabatha.

On Women's Month, Mathabatha said it was the duty of government to ensure that "we break the historic barriers which have denied women opportunities to provide for themselves and their families.

As leaders, we must also empower women to be able to stand up and reject oppression in all its manifestations. One of the better defences we can provide for women is to ensure their socio-economic liberation. In this regard, I must really commend the local government sphere for having done relatively well when it comes to the issue of gender parity."

He urged SALGA, as an association of municipalities, to carry its mandate to ensure that municipalities take basic services to the people. "We must always ensure that the local government space is democratised, allowing the voices of our people to guide development in their own communities. It is also your responsibility as SALGA to ensure that our municipalities are well-oiled machines for effective and efficient delivery of services to our communities," emphasised Mathabatha.

He noted some of the challenges that the Provincial Members Assembly should assist municipalities in overcoming:

- o The challenge of poor accountability and relationship with communities;
- o Problems with the political administrative interface:
- o Poor compliance with the legislative and regulatory frameworks;
- o Corruption and fraud;
- o Lack of proper planning and poor project management;
- Lack of forward and integrated planning on current and capital projects;
- o At times lack of suitably qualified and skilled personnel; and, above all
- o None and under-expenditure of the Municipal



Infrastructure Grant.

"All these challenges deserves our immediate attention and action, however, we need much tenacity when it comes to the issue of inability to spend on conditional infrastructure grants." He said MIG issue has been a problem for most of "our municipalities". "This meeting would have betrayed its purpose if it can't sufficiently deal with this matter. Whatever the problems are, there should be a solution, and that solution should be found in this meeting. Earlier this year, we met with you in a meeting convened by the Auditor General and amongst other issues, the MIG spending was discussed."

"Municipalities are, and should remain our strategic engines of development. You all know about our SEZ initiative. You would also know that such a massive development project is taking place in the space of local government. This SEZ initiative is expected to revitalize Limpopo's industrial economy by utilising our local mineral resources and integrating the industrial chains of both the upstream and downstream. Several plants will be constructed under this SEZ projects."



LDARD CELEBRATES CASUAL DAY AT TANANI MATIKO COOPERATIVE:

impopo Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (LDARD) celebrated the Casual Day at Tanani Matiko Disabled and Multi-Purpose Cooperative at Shawela village, Giyani Municipality, Mopani District on the 7 September 2018.

The annual event acknowledges Persons with Disability and also celebrates the nation that embraces everyone. "It is important for all of us to understand the significance of Casual Day which among others is to raise disability awareness, remove stigma and discrimination attached to the disability which stems from the way society views disability," said LDARD Eastern Cluster Chief Director, Mr Lesetja Kola.

The Bill of Rights in South African Constitution states it clearly that all people have equitable opportunities and equal access to education and employment. The United Nation Convention (UNC) also acknowledges the dignity and freedom of Persons with Disability; fairness between women and men with disability.

The UNC simply highlights the leveling of the playing field to create and promote equal opportunities for all.

In the presentation, South African National Association for the Blind (SANAB) called employers to remove obstacles and create enabling environment to Persons with Disabilities to ensure that equal opportunities are realised. However, Ms Kate Rakomako from SANAB who delivered presentation through the braille, advised employers to have reasonable accommodation such as wheel chair ramps, rails, talking lifts, braille embossers, user-friendly devices, sign language workshop and computers with speech.

In terms of employment equity, LDARD prides itself for exceeding the set target of 2 per cent following the Cabinet's resolution that was adopted in 2009. Furthermore, the Department hosts the annual Persons with Disability in Agriculture and Rural Development (PDARD) Awards. These Awards recognise PDARD's contribution to food security, employment and poverty alleviation.

Tanani Matiko Disabled and Multi-Purpose Cooperative is one of Agricultural cooperatives that LDARD supports to increase production. LDARD MEC Basikopo Makamu also handed over seedlings and farming implements to the cooperative. The cooperative has created permanent employment to 14 women and five men. Project leader, Ms Brenda Mathebula who has impaired vision, thanked LDARD for its continued assistance.

Casual Day is an initiative by National Council of/for Persons with Disabilities (NCPD) meant for fundraising by selling merchandise ranging from T-shirts to caps and donation of accessories such as wheelchairs among others, to make a difference to the lives of Persons with Disabilities. This year was celebrated under the theme, "Be an everyday hero with Persons with Disabilities."

UPDATE ON LIMPOPO COUNCIL:

Limpopo Provincial Government
Executive Council (EXCO) has met on
the 26 September 2018 to discuss
issues having impact on the
improvement of service delivery in the
Province of which the Provincial
Communication and Liaison Services
updated the media at the Office of
the Premier a day later.

Provincial Government Spokesperson Mr Phuti Seloba briefed the media mainly on the Thohoyandou Taxi Rank status, hosting of 2018 Provincial Golden Games, National and School Indigenous Games and Limpopo Annual Sports Awards, stabilisation of Modimolle-Mookgophong and Collins Chabane Local Municipalities, review of the EXCO Izimbizo Programme, illicit, expired goods and illegal businesses and Musina-Makhado Special Economic Zones (SEZs).

He said an appointed Structural Engineer conducted a detailed structural assessment on Thohoyandou Taxi Rank structure and found several structural defects. The taxi facility could therefore not be operational. Government was working on the plans to correct the situation. Construction of this structure started in June 2011 and [literally] reached completion in June 2013.

Regarding sale of expired goods and illegal businesses which sparked looting, violence and damage to property of foreign businesses in Gauteng, Limpopo's Justice, Crime Prevention and Security cluster has developed a preventative approach to combat similar occurrences in the Province, it was reported.

Some of the factors which pose a similar risk in the Province and required pro-active approach were;

 Asylum seekers managing, renting and or operating business contrary to legislation.

- Foreign businesses operating in rented structures and garages that do not seem to comply with health and safety regulations as well as building regulations.
- Lack of inspectorate capacity at municipalities, department of health and Consumer Protection
- Lack of coordination of health and safety inspectorate oversight in the Province.

"The Provincial joints committee will develop a multi-disciplinary operational plan with all stakeholder departments to deal with illicit goods, expired foodstuff and illegal businesses in the Province," Seloba indicated.

Concerning Musina-Makhado SEZs, he said, "A service provider has been appointed to finalise the environmental impact assessment. Limpopo Province with the Department of Trade and Industry undertook an outward mission to China during 23-27 May 2018...

"During this visit, Memorandums of Agreement were signed with 10 companies which committed to investing more than \$US 10 billion in the Musina-Makhado SEZ and four of these agreements were signed on 24 July 2018 at the Union Building by Presidents of South Africa and China. Two of the companies, Power China and TISCO, have already undertaken a visit to the Province as part of their due diligence exercise."

On the allegations of nepotism levelled against Collins Chabane Local Municipality, Seloba said Government would investigate and wrongdoers would be punished.

He said people should be appointed based on merits, qualifications and experience. Such media briefings are held monthly a day following EXCO's meeting.

Limpopo nominated for the National Lilizela Awards

The Provincial Department of Economic Development and Tourism led by the honorable MEC Seaparo Sekoati recently held provincial Lilizela Awards at Meropa Sun Casino and Entertainment World on September 2018.

MDM INTERVENES ON CHALLENGES OF LACK OF WATER AT MUYEXE

he residents of Muyexe in the Greater Giyani Municipality are breathing a sigh of relief after T they started receiving water from communal taps and some in their yards. This after the intervention by the Mopani District Municipality. The district just reverted to the old means of supplying water in Muyexe, by resuscitating three reservoirs that were no longer receiving water from four of the nine boreholes that were previously drilled in Muyexe about eight years ago.

Consistent water shortage has led to the collapse of some agricultural projects that were started by cooperatives just after former President Jacob Zuma declared Muyexe a pilot project under the comprehensive rural development programme. Since then a number of RDP houses, a satellite police station, a sporting facility and a Thusong Centre were built among others. Lack of water remained an area of concern for both the district municipality and the residents. Joint efforts by the Department of Water and Sanitation and Lepelle Northern Water at times covered some parts of Muyexe with water provision, while some residents could not get water from their yards and communal taps. Those residents who have the means have drilled boreholes in their yards and, in turn, sell water to those who solely rely on government for water. In a recent move which has been led by the district's Director for Engineering Services Paradise Shilowa, a pipeline is now abstracting water from Nsami Dam to three reservoirs in Muyexe. "We have decided to intervene in Muyexe after communities in Muyexe spent years without running water, as the water authority we have a responsibility to ensure that our communities across the district get water. In that light we started engaging our partner, Lepelle Northern Water asking them to allow us to come in and also play our part and help to supply water to the community, as you would know that Muyexe is a national project." said Shilowa.

A number of thirsty residents of Muyexe are now seen fetching water from communal taps and some from tanks that have been put in their yards. Forty-six-year-old Khensani Mabedle is one of many residents who say they were surprised to start receiving water, way after reticulation and drilling of boreholes were done in the area. "We no longer pushing wheel barrows for long distances to get water from a borehole that is far from where we residing. We are delighted that we now getting water from communal taps that have been idling for a long time. We are pleading with authorities not to cut water supply to this area again they must continue supplying us with water, water is life we can't survive without." Said the delighted Mabedle.

The Mopani District Municipality has also started conducting tests on five other boreholes in a bit to get them to argument water supply in Muyexe. It is anticipated that the full operational of nine boreholes will go a long way in finding a long lasting solution to water challenges in Muyexe. Residents who are now receiving water in their yards are urged to use water sparingly at all times. Meanwhile a contractor who has been appointed to lay a water pipe line from Nsami Dam to Muyexe is currently doing tests and soon the capacity of water supply in Muyexe will be boosted.



1. Census of Commercial Agriculture

Statistics South Africa in partnership with the National Department of Agriculture and Rural Development is conducting a Census of Commercial Agriculture with the aim of generating fresh data on the number and nature of farming enterprises in the country. The scope of the project includes the following:


- Crop production


2. Domestic Tourism Survey 2017

The Domestic Tourism Survey (DTS) was introduced in 2008 primarily to meet the needs of National Accounts for the compilation of the Tourism Satellite Account (TSA). The South African Tourism (SAT) has been conducting a similar survey, albeit with a greater emphasis on tourism marketing information, since 2001. The key findings of this survey cover the domestic activities for the period from January to December 2017. In some instances, comparisons have been made between the DTS 2016 to 2017 because these surveys have the same reference period, which is January to December.

Total number of trips (million), 2016 - 2017 (RSA)




Generally, there has been an increase in the total number of day and overnight trips between 2016 and 2017. The number of day trips increased from 39,4 million in 2016 to 47,5 million



Percentage of most recent day trips by province of destination, 2017




Percentage of most recent overnight trip by province of destination, 2017





EC for Limpopo Department of Agriculture and Rural Development, Mr Basikopo Makamu and Vhembe District Mayor, Ms Florence Radzilani jointly visited farmers under Makhado Municipality on Saturday the 8 September 2018 on the Presidential "Thuma Mina" call.

During their visit, they handed over fertilisers to farmers whereby the two leaders interacted with them listening to their achievements and challenges.

The MEC commended Mr Rerani Nyadzani, a young farmer who has employed seven permanent employees and mentoring 12 students from Madzivhandila College of Agriculture. Makamu saw this as Rerani's commitment to fight unemployment and improve the lives of

Rerani is a smallholder farmer who operates in an 18 hectare land situated at Mphaila village. He produces cash crops such as butternut, different types of chillies, Macadamia, peppers (Green, Red and Yellow) and baby marrows among others.

His produce is sold locally and at National markets. Through the Department's Comprehensive Agricultural Support Programme, Rerani received about 800 bags of fertilisers for his Agri-business.

"South Africa needs people like Rerani, youth who are zealous and geared for progress, life changers who would stop at nothing until the lives of those around them and beyond are changed.

"These are the youths whom as the Department, we do not hesitate to extend a supporting hand through our various farmer support programmes," said the MEC.

About 13 more farmers from Makhado Municipality also received fertilisers from the LDARD MEC Basikopo Makamu on that day. Approximately 414 X 50kg bags of 234 fertilisers, 322 X 25kg bags of KN03 fertilisers and 86 X 50kg bags of Ammonium Sulphate where handed over to the farmers.

Visibly moved by the LDARD intervention, Mr Ntsaka Matome, a farmer from Hlanganani Service Centre, appreciated Makamu's support and requested him to further assist farmers with infrastructural development and land acquisition.

In his response, MEC touched the ongoing land debate. He assured local traditional leaders that expropriation of land without compensation will not affect the land in their jurisdiction. He pleaded with

COLLINS CHABANE MUNICIPALITY COMPLETES XITLHELANI RING ROAD AND XIKUNDU ROAD

he Xitlhelani ring road project at Malamulele, Collins Chabane Local Municipality, has been completed.

The 3.6 km road construction project commenced in September 2017 and the initial time frame for completion set by the municipality was a six month period but it has reached its climax earlier in January after only four months. On this project, the municipality spent R27 million on the upgrade from a gravelled road into a tar road and the contractors appointed are done with the final snag listings.

Prior to this project, motorists around Malamulele were driving on a gravelled Xitlhelani ring road in poor state especially during the rainy weather conditions, there were no free flowing movements of cars, taxis and buses something which commuters found very challenging. Following the completion of the Xitlhelani ring road earlier this year, there is a free flowing movement of cars without

this year, there is a free flowing movement of cars without traffic congestions and this delights Malamulele road users due to the fact that building new roads is a great way to boost the local economy.

Nearby properties can benefit from improving transportation networks. Nice, new roads means that more people will be attracted to the area, which boosts local tourism and supports local businesses. Plus, newer roads that are easier to drive on which means that your daily commute will be faster and put less wear and tear on the vehicles.

Also, the building up of a community's infrastructure such as Xitlhelani ring road is a great way to pass on cost savings that will benefit property values.

Meanwhile, the Municipality has also completed a 7km Xikundu road project outside Saselemani village. The initial project was started by the Thulamela Local Municipality in 2016 before Collins Chabane Local Municipality was established.

The contractors appointed by Thulamela Municipality continued with the constructions until the end. No amount of funds spent on this project has been disclosed at this stage but however, the total approved Municipal Infrastructure Grant (MIG) for all projects including Xitlhelani ring road and Xikundu road is estimated at R61.6 million.

Xikundu road is also a National government project to honour the late former Minister of the Department of Public Services and Administrations (DPSA), Honourable Collins Chabane, and the road is heading straight to his house after diverging from the R524 Punda Maria road.

TRANSPORT MEC STRESSES OVER CONSISTENT ROAD FATALITIES

MEC for Transport and Community Safety Mme Makoma Makhurupetje has expressed her concerns over a number of road collisions that are continuing to claim lives in the province's N1 High way recently.

This follows a multiple vehicle tragic accident which occurred on the N1 between Kranskop and Nyl Toll Plaza on Friday, 19 October 2018, when a fatigued truck driver lost control of his vehicle due to a tyre burst, leading to him crashing into a number of other vehicles, in an on-coming traffic, including the 22-seater Quantum coming from Bochum heading to Thembisa and a Ford bakkie with a driver and one passenger on board.

A total of 26 lives including of two children were lost.

"I am worried about the manner in which the accidents are happening in this province, more especially the recent ones on the N1 between Kranskop and Polokwane. It was very devastating when I got to the scene, it was too bad." Laments Makhurupetje

The area where the accident happened is actually demarcated as the High Accident Zone and that shows that there are number of accidents occurring either at the same spot or on the same road.

Makhurupetje has insisted that the Limpopo Provincial Government's main concern is that the road is too narrow to an extent that if the accidents happen on the other side between Kranskop and Pretoria, certainly the on-coming traffic would not be affected unlike between Kranskop and Polokwane.

The MEC highlighted that the Limpopo Provincial Government is concerned about the condition of the road itself also taking into consideration that at the beginning of September, on the same stretch of road, 22 people died in two separate accidents involving buses. One bus from Zambia veered off the road near the Caltex garage (30km outside Polokwane) and 10 passengers lost their lives. Within a space of a week, another bus coming from Zimbabwe claimed 12 lives after veering off the road on the N1 between Mokopane and Modimolle.

Makhurupetje called for the South African National Road Agency (SANRAL) and National Department of Transport to prioritise the road in order to avoid more fatalities.

"What happened is a disaster and the accident happened in an area clearly demarcated as a high accident zone. Given the fact that this is a third accident to happen within a short space of time on the N1 road. We think it is now time for SANRAL and the national government to declare a disaster on this road - as we cannot continue to lose lives in this manner." She concluded


