very year during this period, South Africa observes October Transport Month (OTM), which is a campaign that is driven by government to demonstrate service delivery across all modes of transport. At its inception, the OTM Campaign was conceived as a call to action for members of the public to use Public Transport to address the challenges of traffic congestion on South African roads.

It started with what was dubbed "Car Free Day", which was encouraging motorists to make use of public transport instead of using their cars to work. Over the years, the OTM has evolved into campaign that demonstrates service delivery, particularly the investment that government has made on transport infrastructure. This year marks the 17th instalment of the yearly October Transport Month (OTM) Campaign, which is observed under the theme: "S'ya yi shov'ingolovane": together building infrastructure that builds lives and livelihoods. This period presents an opportunity for government to nurture partnerships with our communities and businesses alike, in providing a safer, more affordable, accessible, and reliable transport system.

#### **Public Transport**

Government supports the provision of Public Transport through by providing a regulatory framework that governs the issuance of operating licences to the different modes. In the case of contracted busses, government provides operational subsidy to the bus companies for all the trips and kilometres travelled ferrying passengers from place to place for various reasons, social, economic, and otherwise. Government further provides a grant annually to the Taxi industry aimed at financially assisting the industry to better manage their affairs and building requisite capacity within its leadership.

In the previous financial year (2021/2022) the Limpopo Department of Transport and Community Safety spent R 741, 3 million in operational subsidy which was paid to contracted bus companies. The operational subsidy paid to contracted bus companies benefitted 27 million (27 150 077) passengers across the province. The subsidy served to cushion passengers who under normal circumstances would not have afforded the high costs of travelling. Through additional funding provided the Taxi industry was assisted and managed to take all Taxi Associations through an election programme to renew the mandate of the leaders serving at various levels of the industry. Through the Provincial Regulatory Entity (PRE), 2777 applications for operating licences where processed and adjudicated during the previous financial year. This is done to facilitate entrance to the industry by new players with the aim of ensuring general compliance to regulations by public transport operators.

The Driver of the Year (DOTY) annual competition is one of the flagship programmes of the Department of Transport and Community Safety, under the Road Safety component. The competition also improves knowledge, skills and attitudes of the professional drivers and ultimately improving the standard of vehicle driving. Competing drivers are subjected to pre-trip inspection, theory, track, and road tests.

The focus on the taxi industry is motivated by the fact that the sector is responsible for transporting more people as compared to buses and other forms of public transport.

The reduction of road crashes involving taxi's is therefore imperative considering that when a taxi is involved in an accident, many people suffer injuries, and some even lose their lives. It remains the overall objective of this competition to enhance safety on our roads in line with the National Road Safety Strategy of reducing road traffic fatalities by 50% in 2030.

### CT and Mamogram scans at St Rita's Hospital to cut travelling distance

Inister of health Dr Joe Phaahla together with Limpopo Premier Mr Chupu Stanley Mathabatha joined by Limpopo MEC Dr Phophi Ramathuba launched breast cancer awareness month on September 13 at St Rita's hospital in Sekhukhune district under Makhuduthamaga Municipality.

Members of the community in and surrounding Sekhukhune showed their commitment by attending the event in numbers to witness the handing over of Computerised Technology (CT) scans fitted with Picture Archive and communications systems (PACS) Radiology information systems( RIS) provided to their hospital By department of health.

Phaahla Mosima one of the community members said," we really appreciate what the Premier of Limpopo Mr Chupu Mathabatha together with Dr Joe Phaahla and MEC of health for bringing us the machine that will help us through the fight of cancer. It sad to see our women losing their life's simply because they had to wait for a long period of time to be treated as equipment are far from us". "From today we are confident that Dr's and nurses in St. Rita's hospital will work extremely hard in ensuring



that the life's of people in the community are saved", Mosima added.

In Limpopo province all the regional hospitals have the CT scans including Mankweng hospital and Petersburg hospital. This means that people in the province especially in the rural communities' lives are saved from the cancer pandemic.

Dr Phophi Ramathuba said, "As part of the breast cancer awareness campaign, we felt as a province that it is important for the minister to come to this part of the province in the rural area as we prioritise rural areas".

Women in the rural area takes time to be diagnosed for breast cancer

and some are not even aware about it. So the equipment that we are handing over today, was available in Petersburg hospital, and Mankweng hospital as you can see Sekhukhune is extremely far from these two hospitals and patients used to lose their lives along the way and some along the process of waiting to be scanned. So with this machine's brought to hospital in rural areas we have cut the trip short and people will receive help locally, Ramathuba added.

Minister of health Dr Joe Phaahla in his address mentioned that, "it is important to always insure that service delivery more especially in the public service is been strengthened in a way that it will enable members of the community in rural areas to have equal health services as compared to those in the urban area".

"Let's all ensure that when equipments are provided for us, we take care of them, we keep then clean and ensuring it's safe at all costs. I have noticed that here in St. Rita's hospital there's a lot of improvement compared to the last time I was here and this shows that people are no longer frustrated by service delivered in the hospitals",



commended Phaahla. Premier, Mr Chupu Stanley Mathabatha in his address mentioned that he is remanding MEC Dr Phophi Ramathuba for championing rural matters campaign. The campaign will contribute significantly to the broader objectives of reducing the backlog of surgeries in the hospitals and it will reduce the burden of communicable disease such as HIV and Tuberculosis.

"I want to urge women across our province to go for check-ups for breast cancer. They should always remember early detection can save their life's," added Mathabatha .**NM** 

### Changing face of rural health in Limpopo

he face of rural health in Limpopo is changing for the better, thanks to the



President Cyril Ramaphosa, who joined a walk-about at the Letaba Regional Hospital. The President gained first-hand experience of life-changing surgical procedures being performed at remote and under-resourced health facilities in the Province. The President was impressed.

Healthcare practitioners in different facilities have commended MEC Ramathuba for leading the initiative, with many expressing that this campaign has helped reduce the surgical backlog and the waiting period in their facilities. Local healthcare practitioners have expressed excitement to have experienced complicated procedures being performed in their facilities for the first time. In addition, the campaign is contributing to the transfer of skills and experience to local healthcare practitioners. Beneficiaries have hailed the campaign which they say has brought quality healthcare services to their doorstep and has improved their confidence in the public healthcare system.

Rural Health Matters Campaign, championed by MEC Dr. Phophi Ramathuba. The campaign mobilizes specialist doctors from across the country to offer specialist services in far-flung rural healthcare facilities. Central to the aim of this campaign is to reduce surgical backlogs in health facilities across the Province.

Since its inception, the campaign has seen over 4000 patients benefitting from a variety of surgical procedures ranging from orthopedic, Urogynaecology, pediatric surgery, ophthalmology, maxillofacial surgery, gynecology, amongst others. So far the campaign has been taken to Helen Franz hospital in Capricorn district, Donald Fraser hospital in Vhembe District, Ellisras hospital in Waterberg District, Philadelphia hospital in Sekhukhune District, Maphutha Malatji hospital in Mopani District

Speaking about the campaign, MEC Ramathuba says that "the campaign has mobilized a team of medical and dental specialists, and that, it is critical that patients in rural areas reap the fruits of democracy and access quality healthcare, just like people living in urban areas" Recently, the campaign attracted the attention of

### Childhood cancer requires societal action

ancer is one of the leading causes of morbidity and mortality in children globally. ancer is one of the leading causes of morbidity and mortality in children globally.

An estimated 800 to1000 children are diagnosed with cancer annually in South Africa.

The most common type of childhood cancers in South Africa are leukemia, lymphoma, brain tumors, nephroblastoma/Wilms tumors – cancer of the kidneys and soft tissue sarcomas, which are tumors that begin in the connective tissue.

Most childhood cancers can be cured with generic medicines and specific forms of treatment, including surgery, radiotherapy and chemotherapy. However, this is reliant on early detection and diagnosis followed by evidence-based therapy.

The road to recovery for cancer patients is very challenging, hence the need for tailored supportive care interventions informed by the patients and caregivers' current reality/social determinants of health. The social determinants of health include factors such as socioeconomic status, education, neighborhood and physical environment, employment, and social support networks, as well as access to health care.

Rural residents often encounter barriers to healthcare e.g., financial means, transportation to services etc. which impacts negatively on health outcomes.

In high-income countries, where comprehensive services are accessible, more than 80% of children with cancer are cured. In low-andmiddle-income countries such as South Africa, less than 30% are cured.

A 2014 research paper published in Stones, David K., et al. entitled "Childhood cancer survival rates in two South African units", reports an overall survival rate of 52.1% in South African. The World Health Organization (WHO) has set a goal of achieving at least 60% survival for all children with cancer by 2030.

Early diagnosis is paramount to improving the survival rate for many cancers in children. Early diagnosis starts at home, within the community. Public awareness of the early warning signs of childhood cancer becomes critical because it encourages early detection, earlier diagnosis, early treatment initiation, which ultimately leads to improved outcomes.

In South Africa, and more specifically in the Province of Limpopo, the Saint Siluan Early Warning Signs list is used as per below to educate families and primary health care providers on the early warning signs of childhood cancer:

- **S** *Seek* medical help early for persistent symptoms
- I White spot in the eye, new squint, sudden blindness or bulging eyeball
- L Lump on the stomach, pelvis, head, arms, legs, testicle, or glands
- U Unexplained fever present for over two weeks, weight loss, fatigue, pale appearance, easy bruising & bleeding
- **A** *Aching* bones, joints, back and easy fractures
- N Neurological signs, a change in walk, balance or speech, regression, contiguous headaches with/without vomiting & enlarged head

Limpopo Province has invested significantly in pediatric oncology services over the last few years. It has a Paediatric Oncology Unit at the Tertiary Hospital that is headed by a Paediatric Oncologist, supported by paediatric oncology nurses. All children with the early warning signs of cancer in the province are referred to the Paediatric Oncology Unit, also referred to as Ward L, for a diagnosis and treatment.

Myths and misconceptions about cancer in children, often based on cultural and religious beliefs, continues to hamper efforts to improve the survival of children with cancer in the province. Many families delay in accessing a health care facility, opting for home remedies, traditional and/or spiritual interventions as a first line of response.

Children are then only taken to a health facility when all else has failed, and the cancer has progressed (stage 3 or 4), drastically reducing the child's chances to be cured or survive

similarly, cultural and religious beliefs have also been linked to children defaulting on treatment only to return to the health care system when the disease has advanced. The consequences of delays are dire with negative effects on health outcomes. Losing children to cancer, who could have been saved if diagnosed early and treatment regimen followed, is most heartbreaking to competent and compassionate doctors and nurses who have devoted their lives to saving the lives of children with cancer. It has also created an unpalatable dichotomy for a health system that has consciously invested in the infrastructure, drugs and supplies to provide quality care to children with cancer.

The Limpopo Department of Health has initiated a programme to deliberately and aggressively empower families, communities, traditional health practitioners, faithbased leaders, traditional leaders, local councilors and any other community leaders, on the early warning signs of childhood cancer. The underlying message of the programme is that survival of our children is only achievable if we all hold hands in ensuring early detection of the early warning signs, early diagnosis, treatment initiation and adherence. The Department has developed a "Childhood Cancer Awareness Pack for Community Leaders" which encompasses all the necessary information and guidance for all stakeholders to work synergistically. Everyone in the community has a role to play in children's health and well-being.

"It is important that the schools only accept the Ultra High Temperature (UHT) milk cartons because they have a longer shelf life since most schools do not have the refrigeration services to keep the milk to safeguard the roles of NSNP in the school. I hope the learners will now change their mindset about milk being disgusting with all messages shared through the learners' activities executed today" said Nonhlanhla Mashigo, Deputy Director for Monitoring, Research and Knowledge Management NSNP.

The day was not only meant to engage in the nutrition of learners, but also to improve on the waste management to make the dairy sector more sustainable because some learners previously got rid of milk when they were served in the school once a week. Many schools in the province do not offer the breakfast programme which includes milk therefore learners are currently being given a milk carton to consume at home in some schools. **CN**

## Limpopo **Celebrates** Heritage Day

Mokwakwaila- Heritage Day on September 24<sup>th</sup> is a day that celebrates South Africa's roots, their rich, vibrant, and diverse cultures. South Africa is called the "Rainbow Nation" due to its color and diversity, and it is consisting of 11 official languages therefore Heritage Day exists. Its goal is to nurture and embrace South African culture for what it truly is, accepting all races and genders.

September 24 was previously known in South Africa as Shaka Day, a day commemorating the former Zulu King. Shaka was known for uniting the Zulu clan together and forming the Zulu nation back in the 18 centuries. Every year, South Africans would gather at his grave to honor him.

The Limpopo Provincial Government, led by Treasury MEC Seaparo Sekoati who was representing Premier Stanley Chupu Mathabatha, has joined the rest of the country in commemorating this day.

This year's commemorations were held at the Mokwakwaila Stadium in the Greater Letaba Municipality under the theme:

#### "Celebrating The Legacy Of Solomon Linda And South Africa's Indigenous Music"

Notably, the Limpopo Province is one of the richest provinces when it comes to the diversity of cultural heritage.

It is the home of great Mapungubwe which is South Africa's first City of Gold that flourished back in the 12<sup>th</sup> century.

The best way to preserve your culture is to keep it alive. For obvious reasons, it is vital to preserve our cultures, history, and traditions. Cultures and languages are vanishing due to a lack of awareness and that is a significant loss for mankind.

Conserving culture encourages people to learn and appreciate it. And it is through this experience that mankind can realize what makes us all human and MEC Sekoati has urged the youth of Limpopo to

embrace their rich heritage.

generation is concerned at a manner in which today's generation of young people is distancing themselves from heritage matters.

He said it is extremely dangerous for the youth to want to define themselves in terms of where they want to be without seeking relationships with who they are.

"I always say that no matter how many degrees one may have, you remain illiterate if you don't know your own history. Without this knowledge of history, one is just like a tree with dead roots. The future for such a tree is bleak.

The MEC also urged parents to promote their native languages at homes instead of permitting their children to speak their "own" languages with a twang accent. He has called on parents to not take part in tendencies to extinct the native languages.

"It is more painful to hear our children despising our own African languages. The Truth is that our languages are facing a real possibility of extinctions; very soon if we don't act swiftly, we will have no young people speaking Tshivenda, Xitsonga or Sepedi. MN
