We can't claim to be the descendants of Charlotte Maxeke while we dine and wine with those men who do not financially support their wives and children;

We can't say that love Charlotte Maxeke while we still discriminate against members of the LQBTQI community.

The Charlotte Maxeke in whose memory we are celebrating this National Women's Day hated exclusion, oppression, discrimination and violence.

As the Provincial Government of Limpopo, we are all hands on deck, acting in partnership with social partners to realise the ideal of women's equality in our life time.

We have put in place a number of equity measures to support our drive for equality. This is not a special favour we are doing for women, equality is an inherent human rights. Programme Director

It would be a grave injustice if I concluded my welcome remarks without recognising the gallant effort of the many women of our province and our country in the battle against Covid-19.

Most of the healthcare workers, the doctors and the nurses who are in the trenches against this invisible enemy, are women.

Amongst others, surgeons in different specialities are spending weeks in rural hospitals operating patients, eg our female Opthalmologists will be operating 150 cataracts to poor people in the villages. The victories we have recorded thus far against this deadly virus is owed to their selfless and fearless efforts by women.

Indeed, Charlotte Maxeke would have been proud of the bravery of the women of this generation.

Women have also been leading when it comes to the important task of vaccination. Our numbers are confirming that women are providing practical leadership against this virus. This is our moment to say to all the women of our country that, with you leading from the front, we know that victory is certain.

We should not rest for as long as boardrooms in the private sector remain White and male dominated;

We should not rest as long as there are those men who require court orders for them to maintain their children and wives;

We should never rest for as long as women continue to be beaten and abused by their husbands;

We should never rest for as long as the rape and mutilation of women continues. We are no not prepared to forget the gains that women have made since the 1956 Women's march to the Union Buildings.

We are fully aware that the 1994 democratic dispensation was achieved amongst others because of the immense contribution by women.

As we battle with the triple challenge of poverty, unemployment and inquality, we know fully well that Covid-19 is threatening to reverse the gains that we have made since 1994. Having gathered here today, we take this opportunity to send our message of support to all the mother's, daughters, wife's and girl children, who are suffering from all manners of abuse. We are calling upon our law enforcement agencies to show no mercy when they deal with perpetrators of women abuse.

As Limpopo we are confident that women have risen, young women are rising and all women will emerge victorious against all odds.

With those few words of welcome, I wish to take this opportunity and say 'happy National Women's Day to all the women of our country'.
