MEN NEED TO PLAY A BIGGER ROLE IN ENDING-GENDER BASED VIOLENCE

International Men's Day falls on 19 November. The day's activities celebrates the positive value men bring to the world, their families and communities. The day focuses on the impact positive role models have on the lives of young men and boys. It also highlights physical and mental health risks that affect men.

The day is intended to celebrate positive masculinity and the role men play in their families and communities. While this is an important day in its own right, South Africa continues to be gripped by unrelenting wave of gender-based violence. Within this context the department calls on men to practise positive masculinity by denouncing gender-based violence, by reporting perpetrators of abuse, and by mentoring younger men, and boys to be respectful and to serve as champions for gender equality.

The 2019 theme for International Men's Day is: *Making a difference for men and boys*. The Department of Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities calls on South African men to heed President Ramaphosa's call and be a part of the solution in ending gender-based violence. "Positive Masculinity is about respecting the tenets of gender equality, and men holding other men to account for their actions. We need men to aspire to high moral values and not to allow other men to denigrate, insult, or objectify women for their own entertainment," said Minister in the Presidency for Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities, Maite Nkoana-Mashabane.

The Emergency Action Plan unveiled by President Ramaphosa on 18 September aims to combat violence against women and children through a coordinated government and civil society effort. While the Interim Steering Committee on Gender-Based Violence and Femicide (GBVF) coordinates the implementation of the GBVF, men's organisations are

encouraged to intensify programmes that mentor boys and young men to contribute

positively to their communities.

South Africa will enter the 16 Days of Activism for No Violence Against Women and Children campaign - a United Nations campaign that takes place annually from 25 November (International Day of No Violence against Women) to 10 December

(International Human Rights Day).

The department will kickstart the 16 Days of Activism for No Violence Against Women and Children campaign in Ga-Seleka, Lephalale Local Municipality, Waterberg District Municipality, on 25 November 2019.

Men are encouraged to use the campaign period to launch sustainable long-term programmes to encourage positive masculinity in their communities.
