Today, it is my great pleasure to be here with you as we turn the sod for the construction of the Limpopo Academic Hospital.

You will be pleased to be informed that on the 29th May this year, Premier Mathabatha was also here for the handing over of this site to the contractor.

It was during that occasion, where we made a commitment to the people of Limpopo that, yourself as the Minister of Health, will be here for a sod-turning programme. That is why we are pleased to have you here today.

As you know, this is going to be a 488-bed hospital providing over twenty services.
