As we embark on this journey, let us leverage the Special Economic Zones in Musina-Makhado and Fetakgomo-Tubatse to achieve our developmental aspirations.

Higher learning institutions must adapt their curricula to meet the demands of the everchanging world of work. The envisaged Sekhukhune Mining Academy, Giyani TUT Campus, and other institutions must reimagine their roles in this new landscape.

Technical and Vocational Training (TVET) Colleges are essential in this endeavour. They offer industry-relevant training, bridging the gap between education and work, and preparing students for entrepreneurship. This is what our country demands now.
