Today, we mourn not just for the Makhurupetje family, but for all of us who had the privilege of knowing and working with Mpho.

Similarly, we take this opportunity to pay our respects to our fallen soldiers who perished in the eastern Democratic Republic of Congo while on a peacekeeping mission. We mourn with their families and urge our communities to stand in solidarity with them during this difficult time.

Death is a cruel thief,

It knocks without warning, stealing our joys. It silences laughter and leaves echoes of sorrow. It robs us of our brothers, our sisters, our dreams.

And today, it has stolen from the Makhurupetje family - A son, a brother, a leader, a friend.

The weight of grief is heaviest upon those left behind,

And today, our hearts ache for our dear Speaker, Ms. Makoma Makhurupetje, Who must now walk a road darkened by the absence of her beloved brother, Mpho Vincent Makhurupetje.

When we received the heartbreaking news of Mpho's passing, it felt like a wound not just to his family but to all of us who knew him. A life taken at 51 feels unfair, too soon, too sudden. As a government, when we lose someone before they reach the expected years of life, we feel a deep sense of loss and failure because each life is a story that deserves to be told in full.

Mpho was a man of passion and conviction. His love for politics was evident from a young age, and he dedicated his life to the liberation struggle, ensuring that the dreams of our people were not just spoken but realized. As a loyal member of the African National Congress, he led with courage in many youth structures and within his branch, believing in the ideals of a free and prosperous South Africa.

Today, as we reflect on Mpho's life, we must ask ourselves: Are we nurturing leaders like him? Are our young people ready to take the baton? The answer must be yes. Mpho lived in a time when communities are struggling for basic necessities, and unfortunately, some of those struggles remain today. One of the greatest challenges facing our people is the shortage of water. Water is a necessity, not a luxury.

As a government, we are working tirelessly to improve water supply in our communities, but illegal connections and the so-called "Water Mafia" are making this fight harder. Let it be clear—those who steal water from our people will face the full might of the law. We are working with law enforcement to put an end to these criminal activities, and soon, the perpetrators will be held accountable.

Even as we mourn, we must also look to the future. Our country has been entrusted with the presidency of the G20 this year, a responsibility that places South Africa at the center of global economic discussions.

Limpopo must be ready to take its place in these conversations and ensure that we benefit from the opportunities that arise. We must be proud ambassadors of our province, showcasing the beauty, culture, and potential of Limpopo to the world.

To the Makhurupetje family, we stand with you in this difficult time. Losing a loved one is never easy, and the pain of parting is immeasurable.
