CESA has become a respected voice for engineering excellence, ethical conduct, sustainable infrastructure development and professional integrity.

Your contribution extends far beyond technical advisory services. You are partners in economic growth, partners in transformation and partners in building a capable developmental state.

The 7th Administration has placed infrastructure development at the centre of economic recovery, industrialisation and job creation. Ladies and Gentlemen,

One of the greatest challenges confronting many provinces and municipalities is the shortage of technical and engineering capacity within the public sector.

CESA can play a transformative role in bridging this gap through skills transfer, mentorship programmes, secondment opportunities and partnerships aimed at developing young professionals within government institutions.

Equally important is the need to strengthen integrity and ethical conduct within the infrastructure environment. The engineering profession carries enormous responsibility because the decisions taken by engineers directly impact on the safety, dignity and wellbeing of communities. Engineers must never allow themselves to be drawn into practices that compromise quality standards, undermine compliance or weaken the durability of public infrastructure for the sake of expediency or political pressure. Your professional obligation is not merely to approve projects, but to safeguard public interest through technical excellence, honesty and accountability.

As government, we expect engineers to remain independent, principled and guided by the highest ethical standards. You must not be led by politicians on technical matters; instead, you must guide leadership with professional advice grounded in science, evidence and engineering expertise. Infrastructure built without integrity ultimately fails communities, wastes public resources and erodes public trust. We therefore need a profession that is courageous enough to speak truth to power, uphold quality standards and ensure that every project delivered becomes a lasting investment for future generations.

The future of Limpopo depends on our ability to build strong partnerships between government, industry, professionals and communities.

We therefore welcome CESA's continued willingness to work with government in building sustainable infrastructure, improving service delivery and advancing economic growth.

As government, we remain committed to creating an enabling environment for infrastructure investment, institutional reform and collaborative partnerships that place the interests of our people first.
